# **Reading Assignment**


As you read, think about a theme the author is presenting to the reader. Mark passages that help reveal the theme you have chosen. You should mark a minimum of 4 key passages.

# Stiff by Mary Roach



Stiff is an oddly compelling, often hilarious exploration of the strange lives of our bodies postmortem. For two thousand years, cadavers—some willingly, some unwittingly—have been involved in science's boldest strides and weirdest undertakings. They've tested France's first guillotines, ridden the NASA Space Shuttle, been crucified in a Parisian laboratory to test the authenticity of the Shroud of Turin, and helped solve the mystery of TWA Flight 800. For every new surgical procedure, from heart transplants to gender reassignment surgery, cadavers have been there alongside surgeons, making history in their quiet way.


#### How Starbucks Saved My Life by Michael Gates Gill




#### Our Boys by Joe Drape

The football team in Smith Center, Kansas, holders of the nation's longest high-school winning streak, embrace a philosophy of life taught by their legendary coach, Roger Barta: "Respect each other, then learn to love each other and together we are champions." But as the Redmen embarked on a quest for a fifth consecutive state title, they faced a potentially destabilizing transition: the greatest senior class in school history had graduated, and Coach Barta was contemplating retirement. In Smith Center—population: 1,931—this changing of the guard was seismic. Hours removed from the nearest city, the town revolves around "our boys" in a way that goes to the heart of what America's heartland is today.

#### The Other Wes Moore: One Name, Two Fates by Wes Moore

Two kids with the same name lived in the same decaying city. One went on to be a Rhodes Scholar, decorated combat veteran, White House Fellow, and business leader. The other is serving a life sentence in prison. Here is the story of two boys and the journey of a generation. In December 2000, the Baltimore Sun ran a small piece about Wes Moore, a local student who had just received a Rhodes Scholarship. The same paper also ran a series of articles about four young men who had allegedly killed a police officer in a spectacularly botched armed robbery. The police were still hunting for two of the suspects who had gone on the lam, a pair of brothers. One was named Wes Moore.

#### One Pager Assignment

A One-Pager is a way of responding to a piece of writing on a single sheet of paper. It represents your own written and graphic interpretation of what you have read. It may be very literal (just based on the facts or information in the piece) or it may be a symbolic representation of the piece, which is preferred and generally scores higher. It helps you as a reader to visualize what you are reading.

#### **Directions:**

Must be on standard sized, unlined paper

Must fill the entire page

Writing must be handwritten in ink... no pencil

Use colored pencils or markers unless the piece demands black and white

# Requirements for Visual:

The following required elements may be arranged on the page in any way you choose.

- 1. Display the author, title, and genre of the book you read.
- 2. Prominently display the **theme**. Be sure that you theme is a complete sentence. (See note below.)
- 3. Display **two or more pieces of textual evidence** from the text that reveal the author's theme.
- 4. Draw an insightful, impressive graphic representation that **illustrates** the theme. This should not be computer generated.

<u>Theme</u> -A unifying idea; underlying meaning of literary work Hint: When thinking about theme, first think of the subject. Then, ask yourself "What is the author saying about that subject?" <u>Example</u>

Toni Morrison's <u>Beloved</u> **suggests** that while the past must be released in order for humans to move forward with their lives, it cannot be forgotten; repressing the past completely is just as damaging as holding on to it too tightly.

#### **Current Event:**

Find an article about a current event that connects to your book through your thematic statement and provide a brief explanation of the thematic connection.

- Good sources: NY Times, Washington Post, LA Times, Houston Chronicle, Miami Herald
- PRINT out this article
- Write a brief paragraph explaining the thematic connection between your book and the article

This must be **stapled** to the **back** of the visual.
