Summary of Results for Scaled Survey Data

The Arlington Independent School District is committed to creating a great place for students to learn, teachers to teach, staff to work, and for parents to send their children to receive a great education. To build on this commitment, the leadership of the school district gathers and analyzes data on four essential goals and measures – Employee Engagement, District Support Services, Parent Satisfaction and Student Engagement. This journey of excellence based on measurable goals began in 2013 and focuses on the use of data to identify gaps, take action, and follow through to ensure continuous improvement in the Arlington Independent School District.

The Parent Satisfaction Survey was administered to all parents with children enrolled in the school district **to assess their level of satisfaction with the school their child attends.** This report provides an overview of the findings for the 2017 administration of the Parent Satisfaction Survey.

- The overall mean for the 2017 survey administration is 4.40 on a scale of 1 to 5, with five being the highest. All individual item means continue to be above a 4.00 on a scale of 1 to 5.
- **Y** Excluding the Superintendent items, the items with the highest mean are:
 - My family is treated with respect at this school. {4.56}
 - The school is clean and well maintained. {4.55}
 - My child has the necessary classroom supplies and equipment for effective learning. {4.55}
 - My child's learning is a high priority at this school. {4.55}
- The lowest item means excluding the Superintendent items are:
 - School rules/discipline plans are enforced consistently at this school. {4.35}
 - I regularly receive feedback from school staff on how well my child is learning. {4.24}
 - I receive positive phone calls, notes, and/or emails about my child from the school. {4.17}
- The mean for the school pride item, "I would recommend this school to other parents," increased from 4.40 to 4.43. The means for the two superintendent items also increased.

Figure 1 (page 3) shows the percentage distribution of response choices across all items in the current survey administration. Parents choosing "Strongly Agree" and "Agree" equaled 87.7%. This represents an increase in percent of responses of 1.1%, and a positive shift (or decrease) in percent of responses in the "Mixed Feelings," "Disagree," and "Strongly Disagree" categories.




Figure 1. Percentage of Responses by Item Response Category

Percentile Benchmark Comparisons

Percentile ranks are used to provide a *normed* comparison for each district's Parent Satisfaction Survey overall mean, and ranges for each item mean. Two benefits of using percentile ranks include:

- (a) a standardized frame of reference for the support characteristic mean / overall mean interpretation, and
- (b) showing where a score, in this case the district's support characteristic means and overall mean, fits within a larger distribution of scores.

The "larger distribution of scores" in this report includes responses from Studer Education partners with students completing the Parent Satisfaction Survey across all survey administrations through Spring 2016. Using Monte Carlo simulation, the survey administration data are used to generate a dataset with 100,000 districts. The simulated dataset is based on the mean and standard deviation of the actual dataset, but has enough cases to smooth out the curve. The simulated dataset is used to calculate the percentile ranks.

AISD's overall mean of 4.40 ranks at the 90th percentile of all benchmark districts' overall means.

Appendix 2 includes a table of ranges for percentile ranks for each item in the Parent Satisfaction survey for district comparison.

<u>Using the Chart</u>: Note from Table 1 in the report that the Arlington ISD overall mean is 4.40. In the chart above, find the "Overall Mean" column and locate the means between which the AISD overall mean of 4.40 is located. The green shading shows 4.40 does not fall between two means, but is closest to or the same as "4.40," the mean aligning to the 90th percentile. This means the AISD overall mean is higher than 90% of benchmark districts. This is confirmed on page 4 in the statement that the Arlington ISD mean of 4.40 is found in the 90th percentile meaning it is higher than 90% of benchmark districts.
