Be reliable

- Commit to long term support
- Be on time for events and conversation

5 Lead by examp

- Act in a way that show others how to behave
- Provide opportunities for role playing or modeling as a way of teaching

2 Build relationships

and get to know your mentee by asking questions

Don't assume anything about your mentee.

Say, "What are you interested in? What are your dreams for the future'

3 Give constructive and timely feedback that builds capacity

> Don't say, "What you need to do is..."

Say, "What is a strateg you might be comfortable using

6 Celebrate

your achievements together

 Set small goals and celebrate accomplishments by doing something you both enjoy

4 Beforthcoming about mistakes

you've made

- Share that talking about mistakes helps one grow
- Remember that discussing mistakes builds trust
