The Role of Health Services:

- For Every Student:
 - Maintain Health History
 - Maintain Immunization Record
 - Maintain Screening Record
 - Maintain Medication Administration Record
 - Maintain Health Visit Record
 - Provide First Aid as Needed
 - Provide Illness Care as Needed
 - Provide First Aid for Staff and Visitors
 - Provide Illness Care as needed for Staff
 - Provide annual training in Bloodborne Pathogens, Diabetes, Hands Only CPR, Food Allergies, and EpiPen Administration to all campus staff
 - Maintain all campus AEDs
 - Maintain a roster of Hepatitis B Vaccine eligible employees and provide a vaccine clinic
 - Provide care for student's with chronic medical needs so they can remain in school



The students we serve:

- 8000 Students with Asthma
- 200 Diabetic Students
- 500 Students with Seizures
- 900 Students with Peanut Allergy
- 4000 Students with Other Food Allergy or Insect Allergy



2016-2017 School Year Numbers to Date:

- 130,000 Clinic Visits
- 26,000 Vision and Hearing Screenings
- 8,000 Scoliosis Screenings

Daily:

- 70 Tube Feedings
- 40 Catheterizations
- 1000 Medications given



Other Activities:

- Coordinate Lion's Club Vision Clinic
- On Campus Vaccine Clinics—500 6th grade students received vaccines for 7th grade
- Vision Van is coming to 7 locations in March to provide an eye exam and glasses for eligible students
- Participate in EpiPens 4 Schools Program—\$164,000 in EpiPens donated to campuses
- Dental Health Arlington—9,000 students receive education and a toothbrush, 4,000 students receive sealants

- Reinforce health lessons learned in the classroom

- Educate campus staff so they are aware of health conditions that may impact a student in the classroom
